The disappointment was and is seven times as hard to stand as fourteen years on the chain gang, but if I had refused this job they wouldn't give me any work at the smelter, in as much as the Personnel Manager is the same fellow for both Companies.

This new job works two shifts, one is from daylight to noon, the other is from noon until dark. I am working on the one from noon until dark, at the present time, I watch the screening plant that screens lime sand for the smelter; there is a breeze that blows from the north until the sun goes down which cools and refreshes.

If we don't change shifts out here I will be able to be in Salt Lake about 10 P.M. Sat. May you will let me drive you to Logan Sunday after work.

September will be a good month to start a mission I think; by then we will have the house built and I will have a few nickles

in the bank. What do you think of that for a time to start?

The last two shifts have been long and drawn out, but when I get used to the job time will fly as fast as the last six weeks of school.

I am afraid there isn't enough I could do for you; maybe some day I will be able to give you what you deserve, or at least a little of what you deserve.

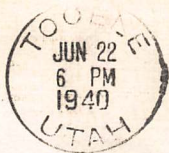
Carry my appreciation to grandma for what she has done for me and everyone.
