Dearest Erlene,

I have just finished a 16 hour shift at the Plant but I don't feel any worse than I used to feel when I worked 8 hours at the smelter. I started at 4 P.M. and finished at 8 P.M.; tomorrow I begin work at 4 P.M. then will be on regular shift after that.

The way it looks I will have to work this week end because it took two days longer to move the outfit and get it to running than they figured. During that time the smelter run low on sand so we will have to work steady for a week or two to make enough sand to keep them running and stock the amount we didn't make for two days.

The boss asked me when I was going back to school. I told him not for two years or more because I was going on a mission when we finished the sand job. He liked to hear that because he is a fellow who lives the religion to the letter. He told me there would be 4 more weeks of running according to figures.

Erlene your letters are swell; I like to receive one every day because when I get home and see a letter from you my heart gains the ten beats a minute

that was lat while at work.

It is time for this constitution of mine to go to bed and will say good night to the sweetest girl friend in the world, with lots of love and appreciation for your interest that you show me.
