
Happy Birthday Dear Wife,

When you write one of these times send me a few telephone numbers of the nearest folks around. Or at least their names. When I'd be able to make the right connections it would be a real good to hear your voice once more.

Two of your letters and one of Walters arrived this day. Thanks for the letters. They help me to keep doing as good as I have been even though I have made many mistakes.

You mentioned about sending some writing material when you sent my comments. yes, I received the writing paper but I haven't been around the Barracks long enough to use it to write you a letter on it - besides the set up that they have to write on in the Barracks is no good -

Just a single cot and a foot locker is what I have. The foot locker is a chest about the order of the one I made for Walter. When I write in the Barracks I set the foot locker across the foot of the cot for a writing desk.  It is uncomfortable as all six ty & the noise in the Barracks
