3 July 1945

Dear Wife & Son —

Stand by for another few lines from Camp Wolters - I'll put a letter in the mail nearly every night then if they hold up in the Postal Service some where you will get sorry at once - That is the way they are doing on this end - Today there was two letters and three Pkgs all day in our bands.

No matter how the letters hold up I know that I have a wife & son whose thoughts go where ever I am & whose love carries out just as far.

This day they took us on a three hour march from about 5 AM to 9 P.M. from 9 till 1:30 we had to eat our own - only we was to stay at camp

wound the Baraka in our work clothes.  
I cleaned my Rifle & sewed on a few  
buttons & did a little needle work.

This damned army is quite a thing  
just like a herd of sheep - you can do  
anything you wish just so long as you  
wish to do what is on the schedule -  
I rise early work a little - lay around 1/2 of a  
day then do things that keeps us  
busy till 3/4 of our evening is shot.  
Oh, well - when the war is over well all  
enlist again -

So long for this evening and car  
loads of love comes with this letter  
to my fine family -
